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Minutes of the General Meeting October 5, 2013

New Business: This is the election cycle in which we normally nominate candidates to replace four outgoing board members but this year we have to nominate five because Rich Ostrander, who has one year left on his term of office, is resigning from the board.

The four outgoing directors who's two year term of office is expiring are: Tom Green, Rich Kinney, Marie Moore, and Mark Wiebens. Nominated were: Tom Green, Rich Kinney, Gary Kubodera, Mark Loewen, Jim Moore, Marie Moore, and Mark Wiebens however, nominations remain open until the election actually takes place. The election will be held at the December 7 meeting. It was further decided that after the election the full board of seven members will decide among themselves who will take over the one year remaining of Rich Ostrander's term.

President Ostrander asked for volunteers to coordinate the annual dinner. Tracy Kleber agreed to take on the job.


The newest machine in this year's show was this 1969 BMW R69 belonging to Mark Loewen.

In Memory of Chuck Otis

February 13, 1920 — October 29, 2013

Chuck was a motorcycle enthusiast. He rode during most of his young life, and then took a long break to focus on family (having to buy a car). He was a member of the original AMA sanctioned Fort Sutter Motorcycle Club (1932 to 1972). It was the Indian club in town. He used to hang out at Joe Sarkees first Motorcycle Service shop on the corner of 16th and C St., where the Salvation Army store is now.

"Chuck had a mid-thirties Indian Scout at that time which was bobbed on both ends. He also had a modified pair of pipes on it that had huge megaphone mufflers attached. He told me that one day at speed the one aimed up at a 45 degree angle launched like a rocket."

He joined the "NEW" AMCA Fort Sutter Chapter in the mid-80s. In 1985 he bought a basket case 1942 Indian Sport Scout. He spent the next few years bringing that bike back to museum quality with the help a several club members.

"He was a meticulous man. I remember him polishing each side of every bolt head with emery cloth. It was his pride and joy. One day in 2005 or so, he called me up and said, 'Hey, I can't ride this bike anymore and I want you to have it.' Excited and appreciative as I was, I cringed at the thought of ruining it and put off picking it up. I had kids and a

messy garage. I didn't know how to ride it, with its stick shift, foot clutch, and left handed throttle. I was so afraid I'd ruin it. In December 2007 I eventually did pick it up. He told me to auction it off and use the money for whatever...but I had a different plan...I taught myself to ride it and still do so. Whenever I look at that incredible machine, I remember the dedicated attention to detail guy who restored it."

"He restored his beautiful 1942 Indian Scout around this time. I remember heading to Cal Expo one rainy night in the mid-90s to help setup our chapter display and there sat Chuck astride his bike in the rain at a traffic light. It was the only way he had to get it there. He was in his 80s. At least my truck was warm and dry when I took him home. He was a true 'old school' gentleman and one of the finest men I've ever known" RICHARD OSTRANDER

He showed that bike at numerous shows, winning multiple awards.

He worked for the Western Pacific railroad for thirty-six years, retiring as an engineer in 1981. He and his wife, Marie spent a good portion of their retirement years touring the USA in their motor home. They traveled to every state in the continental US and into Canada, as well.

He was a descendent of American Patriots, most notably, James Otis of Boston. James Otis is credited with the phrase, "Taxation without representation is tyranny". He was also related to the Mayor of San Francisco (1873-1875), who shared the same name, James Otis.

He celebrated his 68th wedding anniversary in September. His wife, Marie Otis, survives him at

He lived in Hobart Mills, CA, Quincy, CA, Oroville, CA, Union City, CA, and Sacramento. A celebration of life was held at the Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd in the Fireside Room 1615 Morse Ave, Sacramento on Wednesday Nov 13, 2013.


So.... if you come early to have lunch please take your meal into our meeting room!
