#### **Old Business:**

- Club Ride(s): The Fort Sutter Club rides continued in August and September. The August ride was led by Tracy Stahlman who guided the riders onto Hwy 49 then on to Georgetown and Placerville. The September ride was led by John Markley (gave Tracy a break) with the group heading to Woodland and then off to Travis Air Force Base for a tour. Thanks again go out to Tracy Stahlman (and John Markley for the September ride) for his leadership and planning for these monthly rides.
- 2018 Cannonball Motorcycle Run (Portland Maine to Portland Oregon) Every two years since 2010 the Cannonball Motorcycle run has proved to be the most difficult antique motorcycle endurance run in the world. The organizers were matter in fact in making this statement. The riders wholeheartedly agree. This year Fort Sutter provided three riders: Mark Loewen, President, Mark Wiebens, Vice President, and Jeremy Loewen (Mark Loewen's son) Fort Sutter member. #### **New Business:**

- 2018 Sacramento International Auto Show (Sac Auto Show) Again this year Fort Sutter will be displaying their motorcycles at this yearly event. For 2018 the date is October 19, 20, and 21st. Each year Fort Sutter is able to showcase their Antique Motorcycles inside over a three day period. The Sac Auto Show (as it is called) attracts thousands of visitors to see the latest makes and models of cars and trucks. Visitors are also drawn to see classic cars and antique motorcycles. - Fort Sutter Annual Banquet: Tracey Kleber, banquet coordinator, announced the banquet will be held on Saturday February 23, 2019. Location for this event is being reviewed with three potential restaurants being considered. Rich Ostrander suggested trying a new location in downtown Sacramento The Iron Grill for this years event. The Iron Grill has a \$1,000 minimum for banquets. The Fort Sutter Club will provide \$10.00 (\$5.00 increase over last year) towards the price of a meal for members only.
- 2019 Theme for Dixon: The theme for the 2019 Dixon National Show & Swap Meet will be Triumph 82nd year Speed Twin.
   Note: The Speed Twin 5T is a motorcycle that was made by Triumph at their Coventry, and later Meriden factories. Edward Turner, Triumph's Chief Designer and Managing Director, launched the Triumph Speed Twin at the 1937 National Motorcycle Show. The National magazine advertisement for The Dixon National Show & Swap Meet must be submitted no later than December, 2018.
- Wild Bill Hill: 1.) Fort Sutter Member Wild Bill Hill attended the October 6, 2018 meeting and brought copies of the September, 2018 Thunder Roads Magazine. Both Roxannea and Wild Bill wrote an article with photos of the June, 2018 Dixon National Show & Swap Meet. Various photos and stories highlighting the event at the show are included. 2.) Wild Bill also asked if the Fort Sutter Club would like to be a part of the 2019 Autorama held at Cal Expo in Sacramento on February 15 17, 2019. The Sacramento Autorama is one of the oldest and longest running indoor car shows in the world. The car show features over 1,000 of the nation's hottest custom vehicles on display. #### From the Sac Auto Show Website:

While most motor vehicles at the **Sacramento International Auto Show** will be of the four-wheeled variety, there will some stylish two-wheelers on display courtesy of the Fort Sutter Chapter of the Antique Motorcycle Club of America.

Among the 30 bikes in their display (all pre-1983 models) are some British, German and Japanese makes as well as a good variety of American motorcycles including Harley Davidson and Indian. The ages of these machines range from 1911 through 1983 Sure to draw attention will be three Harley Davidson Knuckleheads, notable for being Harley's first successful overhead valve V-twin engine and given the name by riders who thought the engine looked like fists with two knuckles sticking out.

### **2018 Motorcycle Cannonball Details**

(from Cannonball website)

Ten years ago, one man set out to become the first person to take a group of like-minded antique motorcycle riders across the United States on machines that were only often seen in museums and private collections. In 2010, Lonnie Isam Jr's dream and bold sense of adventure took him and his friends from one ocean to the other, forever setting the standard of endurance for man and machine. Since 2010, history has been made and continues to be made; machines are coming out of the woodwork, they are being ridden, they are being enjoyed, and they are being put to the Motorcycle Cannonball test.

The next adventure...the next epic journey... the next ride...will be nothing to slouch at. The next experience will again take us from coast to coast; again it will be a true endurance. It will pit man vs. machine on some of the best two lane, back roads that our beautiful country has to offer! This event will feature motorcycles built before 1929.

In early <u>September 2018</u>, one hundred or so Motorcycle Cannonball riders will start a two-week journey across the United States on motorcycles built before 1929. The route will start on the east coast in **Portland, Maine**, and end on the west coast in **Portland, Oregon** with a rest day halfway through in Historic Sturgis, SD.

This northern route could certainly include all types of weather; from tropical storms and 90-degree temperatures in the East to freezing temperatures and snow in the mountains of the North. With 12 hours of daylight, riders will average around 250 miles per day, culminating in approximately 3,750 miles. All bikes will run the same route in an allotted time schedule. Motorcycles will need to maintain at least 43-50 mph on straight, flat roads. It is estimated that less than 10 miles will be run on interstate highways, and less than 1 of those miles on urban interstates.

The competition will involve correctly navigating the route using each day's Course Instructions. The winner for each class will be the motorcycle and its rider that covers the most onroute mileage over the 16-day run, within each day's specified time schedule and in compliance with the Event Regulations.

any motorcycle manufactured in 1928 or
earlier as originally manufactured and/or
modified in its year of manufacture is
eligible for entry.


