Minutes: Previous minutes from our last meeting were approved as written.

Treasurer's Report: Julie Loewen provided an update to the financial status and states the Club is in good order.

Old Business:

• **Tracy Stahlman: Ride Captain:** Tracy reported on Club rides n December 2020. 1.) The NorCal Swap Meet was held on December 6th and with weather being cool but clear riders were glad to get out and enjoy the chance to find a special part at the swap meet. 2.) Tracy stated that the Nevada County Toy Run to Grass Valley in December was attended by only two Fort Sutter members, Tracy and his wife Kim, along with a few of their friends. With the Covid-19 pandemic limiting attendance participation to only 577 bikes they still served 990 children with toys and food. The 2021 event should see a major increase in riders!

New Business

- Fort Sutter Annual Banquet: Tracey Kleber, Banquet Coordinator: Tracey reports that she has not been successful in finding a suitable location due to the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic. Many locations including restaurants, parks and campgrounds were discussed but none would offer the services needed. Club member Dennis Peterson would like to offer his home in Granite Bay for the banquet, but he is having his kitchen redone at this time and the work wouldn't be completed until August 2021. Tracey stated she will report back at our next meeting with hopefully a location.
- 2021 Fort Sutter Rides: Tracy Stahlman, Ride Captain: Tracy mentioned that all members should visit the Fort Sutter Facebook page to learn of upcoming rides and events. For February he has scheduled a Sacramento River Run for Saturday, February 20th. The Delta area provides excellent riding and should be a great outing to begin the New Year. 





G. What is something interesting about you that others might not already know?



A Remembrance Dale Walksler 1952-2021 By Rich Ostrander



I first met Dale when I was traveling south on Hwy 395 to SoCal to pickup some Super X parts in October 1991 on my 1988 Sportster. I came up on him sitting on a rock, looking down into the Panamint Valley just west of Death Valley. He was wearing a bomber jacket, mirrored aviator shades and smoking a cigarette. Next to him stood an original 1957 blue and white Panhead. It looked like a Marlboro cigarette commercial. He got up and came over and shook my hand and while using his other hand to give me his business card, he said "Hi" Dale Walksler, Walksler Harley Davidson, Mount Vernon, Illinois. We were the best of friends from then forward. If you knew him well it was a pure Dale moment.

In 2002, Dale called knowing I was writing AMCA related articles for a now defunct vintage motorcycle related magazine and wanted me to pen an article about his newly opened Wheels Through Time Museum in Maggie Valley, North Carolina. I asked if I could visit and bring a friend, Lenny Miller. Years before, Lenny had traveled with me to Dale's HD dealership and museum in Mount Vernon, so I thought that he should be included in this one, too. Dale flew us into Charlotte and had a rental car waiting and a trailer for us to stay in just across the stream from his museum.

We had dinner across the street with Dale's father a couple of nights in a row and talked about how he loaned Dale \$10K when he was just 21 to open his Harley Davison dealership in an old tractor dealership in Mount Vernon 275 miles south of Chicago where he was born. He ended up living in an old three story abandoned hospital he bought from the town for a dollar and made it into his house. I had stayed there in the late '90's when I traveled back on my sportster to Pennsylvania to visit my dad. I spent a couple of days visiting with Dale.

The night I arrived he rushed out to greet me and said, "Come on, I want to test drive the car after rebuilding the motor – I have been waiting for you." I grabbed a bottle of wine, that I had in my saddle bag. I had won it that year in the Sonoma AMA Vintage Days West meet for my old 101 Scout and I had saved it to share with Dale. Off we went around midnight in his 1931 Cadillac coupe with a fresh V-16 under the hood drinking wine while driving through corn fields for about a hundred miles. It would start running on one bank of only eight cylinders and Dale would stop and crawl under and smack one of two fuel pumps and the other bank of eight would kick back in. You can't make this stuff up!

The happiest I ever seen Dale was the day his son Matt won his first dirt track race at the Wauseon meet in 2011. I thought he would burst. Dale and I rode many miles, enjoyed many conversations, and enjoyed each others company over the past thirty years outside the spotlight that he was usually under. I will miss my friend dearly.



Tom Green 1938 – 2020



Tom Green was one reason I decided to write a book about the early days of Sacramento motorcycling. My dad left files of photos from Selby Stables races, and Colfax, as well as of people and bokes outside his tiny motorcycle shop near railroad tracks on 16th Street in the early 1950s. My cousin found a two-part series online from 1914 Ft. Sutter newsletters after Harold Ball died. The articles covered history about early dealers and riders whose names I'd heard growing up. I wondered, who knew this history from the 1950s and where did he learn to write so clearly? I found Rich Hardmeyer's name on the newsletters in which the articles ran and called him. Rich said that Tom Green wrote the articles. He gave me his telephone number. I left a message but didn't hear back. One day I picked up the phone and heard, "This is Tom Green." I felt I'd struck gold. Several months later, I visited Tom at his Land Park home. He went through my pictures and a few old AI Lauer invoices. He was very alert and recalled details clearly. Shortly thereafter, he became sick. I'll never forget when he said, "I bought my first motorcycle from your dad. When other dealers wouldn't sell me a bike because of my age, your dad did." Oh, no, I thought to myself, wondering what my dad had done. But Tom seemed grateful, and that was good enough for me. I am glad I got to meet him and hope to someday write as clearly as he did.



Collect; To bring, or come together in a group, gather, to accumulate. A year ago, my good friend and long-time riding buddy was experiencing some health concerns and it was agreed that the time had finally come to disperse his forty odd year collection of old motorcycles and related parts.

For him to finally reach that moment was a major change for him, but the right choice. It fell upon me to take on tasking. With some fifty plus years of experience in old motorcycles, and a lot of friends with special make and model knowledge I developed a plan. Lenny and I did not want a lot of pickers involved but persons that would assemble the parts into rideable machines or to complete one(s) they already had.

Lenny had moved these parts several times over the years to various locations and none were joined together to form a machine. They were stored in two forty-foot semi-trailers, a four-car garage (half with overhead storage) and a large shed. Our friend Carl hauled many truck loads to the dump of stuff stored in the garage just so I would have a place to process parts and assemble basket cases. Loose parts went into a trailer to haul to swap meets and the rest made up the baskets.

I am happy to report that after a year's work the tasking is just about finished. Six major swap meets and thirty basket cases later the plan worked. Over the next couple years, it will be nice to see these motorcycles which were just piles of discarded bits and pieces assembled, polished, painted, and coming back to life. That is rewarding enough. It also means Lenny's and Marna's future caretaking, if needed, is provided for. I would like to thank all who helped me bring this tasking to a successful conclusion on their behalf. Listed below are the baskets that Lenny's collection of parts helped make it possible. A. How long have you been a Fort Sutter Member? 16 years, currently handle the Fort Sutter Website

B. What do/did you do for a living? I have been in the HVAC Industry for 32 Years, 10 as a Union Sheetmetal/Service Technician and the last 22 years as a Sales Service/Project Engineer for commercial heating and air conditioning.

C. When did you first start riding motorcycles or what is your earliest motorcycle memory? My first bike was an Ohlsson & Rice 1 hp custom Mini Bike my dad built around 1968-1969. He procured bike parts from the local dump and utilized a Campbell's Tomato Soup Can for a gas tank. At the time I was only 7 or 8, so it had plenty of power to propel me down the side walk a quite high speed at full throttle. I later road the mini bike as halftime entertainment for the Super Modified Races at West Capitol Raceway in West Sacramento and we got to watch the races for free. I was only to go around the track one time, but when the flag man started waving his hand, I thought he wanted me to go around again. I passed him by and as I started around the track the cars were there waiting to get back to racing, revving their engines as I went by which was a little scary. The crowd gasped as I nearly fell taking the last turn when my feet came off the pegs. When I did not fall, they erupted in applause, my 15 minutes of fame. I could have ridden around that track 100 times.

D. Pictures of past motorcycles. My next bike had to wait until I was out of the house and 19 years old. It was an early 70's Kawasaki 250 street legal Enduro which I bought from an ad in the local newspaper. My friends had a Yamaha 650, a Honda 250 Enduro and a 78 Harley low rider, needless to say, I was always the last to get to where we were going. By the time I caught up they were rested and wanted to get back on the road. I always thought what's the hurry, but fast and furious was how they rode.

My next bike was a 1977 Kawasaki 750 Twin which I bought around 1984. It was a super reliable bike and great fun to ride. The starter never worked but it kicked really easy and was much cooler than pushing a button. It was the first engine I ever attempted to work on. It was not running well and needed the upper end rebuilt. I bought a manual for the bike and started in, new pistons, rings, bored cylinders and rebuilt heads. Once back together the motor barley ran. I took it to the Kawasaki shop and for a hundred bucks or so they properly shimmed the valves, tuned it up and it ran like a top.

It was about 1986 when I bought my next Kawasaki which was a 1978 Z1R 1000, the first bike I owned that I wish I did not sell. Had this bike for a few years and decided to sell for \$1200.00 as I wanted the money for something else. Now they are selling for as high as \$15,000.00.

Around 2002 my wife and I purchased our 1987 Harley Soft tail. I learned a lot more working on this bike, replaced a stator, clutches, new pulley and belt to get more top end on the freeway. Also learned how to tune a S&S Carburetor. Sold the bike about 5 years later.





My wife and I had a 1973 Sportster that we bought from a friend, but I was not a fan of the left side brake. After I cleaned up the tank, repaired the brakes and rebuilt the carburetor, got it running, we sold the bike. We had a 1927 Harley J for a short period of time but decided to sell it as we wanted a bike that my wife and I could ride on together for Fort Sutter events and just getting out for a ride. We sold the bike to a young guy from back East who had a tattoo of a model J on his arm which looked like a bike you would see at the vintage races. He sent us a photo a year later and the bike looked fantastic. He was taking part in vintage races at the beach and also ice racing. We realized then it was meant to be and that the bike had gone to the right person.

E. What do you currently own/ride? We currently have a 1946 FL Knucklehead which I started building in 2006 and finished up in 2009. I started with a set of heads and some parts I purchased from Jack Gormley who was a founding member of the Fort Sutter Club. I bought a basket case engine from a guy back East and then started the process of building a motor with my dad's help as he has built many over the years. I line honed the case races manually at home with a hone I borrowed from Larry at the Harley shop. Larry also set up my cylinders. John Schaffer a founding member of Fort Sutter performed the valve job on my heads. John showed me how to seat the valves with cutting compound at his home shop off of Arden way in Sacramento. I ended up narrowing the front fender for a 21" wheel and then added 3" to the back fender. I wired the bike, installed the electric starter and did my best at the body work before sending it out to get it painted.

We bought a 1975 Harley Davidson Shovelhead about 5 years ago. The bike came with old drum brakes, 40 spoke wheels and the original front end. I installed early 2000 front tubes, 60 spoke wheels, dual disc brakes, new bars with controls, rewired the bike, installed a new rear brake and we rode it on the 2017 Fort Sutter AMCA National Road run in Lake Tahoe.

Soon after the top end was passing oil, so I pulled it apart and removed the high compression pistons someone else had installed and went back closer to stock. I replaced the 40 over cylinders, had the heads rebuilt, put new rocker arms and shafts in and installed a new AB grind Cam and gears.

I decided to pull the transmission out and see what the previous owner had done which turned out to be a good idea as I found many issues. The case leaked badly so I sealed everything up, installed new parts and pieces, installed new 1st and 3rd Andrews close ratio gears and changed the shift pattern to 1 down and 4 up which I am more accustomed to. I am just finishing the last prime of the tins and then I am going to paint. I am now ready to start the break in of the motor and transmission. I also added a speedo drive gear to the transmission with help from my dad, we built a fixture off an old Knuckle case, drilled out my shovelhead case and it actually worked.
