Tribute to Joe Manns October 28, 1950 – February 8, 2021

Joe Manns was born in Clairton, a steel town suburb of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Many of his relatives, of hardworking Eastern European descent, worked in the steel mills and on their farms.

Joe graduated from Thomas Jefferson High School in 1968 and shortly thereafter set off for Cincinnati, Ohio. There, he met Jan, his wife-to-be.

While in Ohio, he interned as a Farrier, learning a skill that would help him support his growing family on down the road in Arizona. He had a marvelous Quarter Horse named Bud whom we both loved to ride at breakneck speed.

Joe and Jan married in 1974. They lived on a farm in Kentucky Bluegrass Country for 4 years, both increasingly yearning to travel and expand their horizons.

We moved to Arizona in 1978, the second year of the winter blizzards that paralyzed much of unprepared Kentucky and neighboring southern states.

Joleen and Mercury were born in Tucson. Joe apprenticed and became an Ironworker, for Local 75, continuing to shoe horses, acquire and ride motorcycles, and play softball.

The Tucson economy lagged, so Joe set off for San Francisco and boomed out of Local Ironworkers 377. As luck would have it, he was able to stay with his sister and brother-in-law, Pam and Doug Rogers, who still live nearby and have always been a large part of his life. One of his first jobs was on the Golden Gate Bridge. Work and money were good, so he travelled back to Arizona to collect his family. We moved to Concord in the early 1980's. He was proud to became a life-long member of Local 377.

Moving into the 21st Century we welcomed son-in-law Jamie and daughter-in-law Stephanie to our family. Joe lived to know three grandchildren (Francesca, Berkeley and Nico), and to find out a fourth grandchild is on the way.

As you all know, his loves were his family, his friends, German Shepherd Dogs, motorcycles, baseball, and of course, the Steelers and the Rolling Stones.

Joe lived life as he would want all to do true to himself and his beliefs, on his own terms, and so willing to help a friend in need.

Joe was proud of his authentically restored 1959 HD Panhead. I had no idea how long the restoration project would take, and in my estimation, it took somewhere close to 3 years. Joe's insistence on accuracy was one of the reasons it took that long, and he refused to use after-market parts!

After he won the Winner's Circle Award, then he set about accessorizing. And he was happy with the "Best Accessorized" Award that, as I recall, he won for many years in a row. Then, there were the years when he helped judge the motorcycles at the meet, a role he took very seriously, and studied for as if he were enrolled in a college course. He was adamantly in favor of the Club remaining as part of the National Judging Circuit. The Dixon Meet, especially because it was held on Father's Day, was a special event for our entire family, including the German Shepherd Dogs that we occasionally brought along, and the red 1967 Cadillac Deville with mag wheels we also brought along.

In 2000, Craig Taylor, grandson of John Cameron an original Booze Fighter, and myself, sat inside a KOA cabin just outside of Atascadero during a frog strangling rain laying out the plans for what in 2001 would become the Four Chapter Run. It would later become the Five Chapter Run when the ISHI Chapter was formed. We started it as an event to bring all the California AMCA Chapter's together each year to ride back roads and catch up with each other. This year 2021 we celebrated the 20th year with the Yerba Buena Chapter hosting it at the KOA outside Cloverdale, CA. All told there have been thirteen gatherings of the tribes with each Chapter at least hosting one, but the Los Angeles group and the Frisco group have hosted many with great success.

They have been based in Atascadero, Bishop, Buellton, Cloverdale, Chico, Felton, Kernville, near Novato and Oakhurst (Yosemite), hotels and campgrounds both. Usually, a ½ day ride on Friday, a full day on Saturday with a BBQ after and ½ day on Sunday for breakfast. Before the 2001 inaugural event some members had been riding with each other since the 70's and 80's. Over the last 20 years the group has become like family. The sad part is more than a few are no longer with us to enjoy it.

For 2021 we celebrated the "opening up" after being "closed down" for nearly a year and a half because of COVID-19. I estimate we had north of forty riders, some two up, and a few ground crew in attendance. A lot of old friends were in the mix with many new faces and a few new young guns. Members from all the California Chapters were in the mix.

An older Triumph, a John Player Norton, a couple of pre-70 BMW's and a 70's Honda 4 mixed it up with a handful of Indian Chiefs, pre and post war. As usual there was a herd of the Milwaukee brand, small and large flatheads, Knuckles, Pans, and Shovels. At least 4 or 5 '65 Pans and every year of generator Shovels and cone motors, stockers, bob jobs and choppers.

It was Bob's first time out for one of our road runs and it would appear the hook has been set deep. A great 600 miles under our wheels.

A big thank you to the Yerba Buena Chapter for being excellent hosts. A special thanks goes out to Manny for driving the trouble truck which thankfully no one needed except for a little fuel mismanagement. Till we meet again. Wheels go round. *Rich*



After three years of exhaustive research and documentation, Kim Edwards's book on motorcycle history in the Sacramento area from 1910 to 1960 was finally made available to the public.

Approximately 150 family members, motorcyclists and the general public gathered to have Kim introduced by fellow motorcyclist and TV personality, Mark S. Allen. She then proceeded to show slides and talk about the pioneers of early motorcycling in Sacramento and sign copies of her book.

Rich Ostrander and Ken Magri (Armando's son) were on hand to field technical questions. Rich Hardmeyer, Bob Henry and Mike Blanchard furnished vintage motorcycles for the presentation. A no host bar was provided by the museum staff for hydration purposes during the recent hot spell. Kim also provided snacks.



The Yellowstone Chapter was scheduled to have their first Road Run in July 2020, but due to the Covid-19 restrictions it was postponed until 2021. Like other AMCA members we were so looking forward to riding the Big Sky of Montana, so we began registering early. Soon the event was sold out! A waiting list was started for those also wanting to ride. In the beginning it was originally planned to have no more than 125 participants, but with the pent-up demand for AMCA members, including myself, to finally get out and ride, Ed Heiliger, Yellowstone Chapter President, announced in April that the Chapter would open registration again. Soon, the number expanded to almost 150 bikes. The Road Run was held at the Big Horn Resort in Billings MT. This hotel proved to be a central location right off the freeway. 


