Walt introduced himself and said he has several antique motorcycles and looks forward to being a member of the Fort Sutter Club. Welcome Walt!

- Membership: Karie Schenken Chairman: Karie reports currently there are 72 Primary members, 19 Associates, 2 Junior, and 11 Honorary members for a total of 104.
- Treasury Report: Julie Loewen Treasurer: Julie reports the Treasury has sufficient funds and will provide a year end statement after the close of 2021.
- <u>Minutes</u>: A motion to approve the minutes as written for the October 2, 2021, meeting was made by Rich Ostrander and seconded by Tracy Stahlman. The motion was unanimously approved.

#### Old Business:

• Fort Sutter October 23<sup>rd</sup> Ride: Update from Rich Ostrander who led the ride while Tracy Stahlman, ride coordinator, was away. Rich provided a short version of the ride at the meeting, however, he has included a full report in this newsletter.

#### New Business:

- **December Ride:** Tracy Stahlman, ride coordinator, reports that Fort Sutter riders will ride from Sacramento to Nevada City to participate in the annual Nevada County Toy Run on Saturday December 11, 2021. Ride details have been sent to all members previously but is also included in this newsletter.
- Elections for 2022-2024 Directors. Voting was held for the four open Board of Director positions for the 2022-2024 term. Nominees were Bob Henry, Julie Loewen, John Markley, Stan Randall, Tracy Stahlman. Ballots were distributed to members in attendance at the December meeting. The following Directors were elected: Bob Henry, Julie Loewen, John Markley, and Tracy Stahlman. Congratulations to the newly elected Board of Directors. After the general meeting, per the Fort Sutter By-laws, a Board meeting was held to nominate and vote for the three open officer positions for the 2022-2024 term, for Vice-President, Treasurer, and Secretary. The results are as follows: Jim Schenken, Vice-President, Julie Loewen, Treasurer and John Markley, Secretary. The Fort Sutter Board, along with all Fort Sutter members would like to thank Mark Wiebens, currently Vice-President, and Stan Randall, Director for their contributions to Fort Sutter over the past several years.
- Fort Sutter Dixon 2022 National Meet: Update: Mark Loewen reports that the National Meet is currently in the planning stages, and he looks forward to a large turn out for 2022. At this point he mentioned that he will be meeting with the Dixon Fairgrounds to review the rental agreement and ultimately sign the contract. Julie Loewen stated beginning in 2022 that a credit card, or debit card will be accepted to purchase items at the event. This includes purchasing a new or renewing membership, merchandise, or raffle tickets. Julie said this will help increase sales of each item throughout the National Show. Volunteers are needed to help perform certain functions at the event. Contact any Fort Sutter Board of Director to offer your help.
- Fort Sutter Chapter Judge update: Eric Olson, current Chapter Deputy Judge, along with his replacement, Bob Henry, provided an update regarding Fort Sutter's National Judging program held during the Dixon National Motorcycle Show & Swap meet. Together, both Eric and Bob, suggested that to help recruit, recognize, and retain local judges for the National Judging, more should be done and offered at each event. Ideas include the following: Breakfast before the Judge's meeting on Saturday morning, lunch vouchers for each judge, provide Fort Sutter Hat (baseball style or wide-brim type) and include a free meet pin. Eric will be providing expense costs for hats at the next meeting.
- **2022 Fort Sutter Road Run:** Mark Wiebens, Road Run coordinator provided an update that included the difficulties being encountered in finding a suitable location for the event in September 2022. Suggestions from the members were to possibly go back to the 2017 Road Run hotel in South Shore. If any member has a contact with a hotel in the vicinity, please contact Mark at (925) 288-0174.
- Annual Banquet: Tracey Kleber, Banquet Coordinator: forwarded potential restaurant locations for the Annual Banquet that is tentatively scheduled for February 26, 2022. After a discussion, the members decided that they would rather have a picnic instead of a restaurant dinner for 2022. Potential locations for the picnic will take place and planning to begin for the July or August timeframe.

## SACRAMENTO MOTORCYCLING A CAPITAL CITY TRADITION BY KIMBERLY REED EDWARDS

A book review by Rich Ostrander to be published in the AMCA Magazine early 2022

Before radio became one of the main sources of entertainment and television was still over the horizon, sporting events captured large numbers of spectators. One of the largest was motorcycle racing on board tracks, dirt ovals, hillclimbs and club field events.

Northern California's Bay area and neighboring San Joaquin Valley had racetracks in almost every city and town. Most events were sponsored by local dealers and clubs. Riders from near and far, plus Joe and Joan Citizen who would never sit in a saddle, would attend these events usually held on a Saturday or Sunday afternoon.

Through Kimberly Reed Edwards well researched book heavy with excellent photographs you will be in Northern California, especially the Sacramento area from the turn of the century to 1960.

Starting with the Capitol City Wheelman bicycle club in 1886 which along with the Sacramento Motorcycle club became the Capitol City Motorcycle club in 1913 and is still active today. The other major club in town was the Fort Sutter Motorcycle club founded in 1934 and still active today under the Antique Motorcycle Club of America. Up until the 1960's both clubs were active in field meets, hillclimbs, endurance and dirt track races.

Many local events were sponsored by local dealers like Frank J. Murray Harley Davidson, started in 1919 until 1950 when the reins were handed to Armando Magri, a successful racer. Joe Sarkees, the first Triumph dealer on the west coast in 1949 was also an active sponsor along with Al Lauer, a former racer who sold the Indian brand. Kimberly's father, Jim Reed purchased the Indian brand from Al in 1952.

A prominent early dealer for Excelsior, William Langley, started the ball rolling when he sponsored the first race in Sacramento in 1911 at the Ag Park track. Many national racing stars came to compete here like Charles Balke, Bob Perry, Jake DeRosier, Roy Seymour, Don Johns and Shrimp Burns from nearby Oakland, CA.

In later years names like Joe Petrali, Paul Albrecht, Armando Magri, Cy Homer, Mario Stillo, Sam Arena, Gene Rhyme, Sprouts Elder, Lammy Lamoreoux and the Milne brothers would ply their trade here.

While meeting these local dealers, riders, racers and club members, you will experience their lifestyle and adventures. So, find a comfortable chair, sit back and enjoy the ride through one of the most interesting and exciting times in motorcycling history.

## CHAPTER RIDE OCT 23, 2021

Tracy Stahlman, our Chapter Road Captain, was off acquiring more venison for his freezer, so a substitute was called for to plan the Chapter's October ride. I made the mistake of volunteering.

A date was set, a route was selected, a lunch stop planned and then for the first time in what has seemed like forever, the skies opened, and it poured. As luck would have it though our Saturday ride was rain free. The route was one of my favorites through the upper Delta and ending with an open house at Dave Kafton's place.

A shout out to the Chapter for pitching in on the bill, a fine gesture. Conversation was lively, a few new friends made, and a good time shared by like-minded wheel spinners.

We left each to his own direction home with Bob and I heading west to the river road and north to Sacramento. I made it just west of the Highway 99 overpass when the FXB stopped dead. Kafton's was less than a mile away and my riding partner is a deft mechanic so not to worry. Plus, a fellow rider in his work truck loaded with tools stopped and wanted to help. Even Dave and Jim Inman came over to assist. The tank had gas and was passing it over to the carb, but the carb was bone dry. Once the carb was removed and thoroughly inspected the hung valve and seat were reset and the empty bowl was filling again much to my relief. It now runs better than it ever has and its potato, potato is back. My thanks to all for the help, especially Bob.
